LIVE FROM LONDON Christmas

Lydia: The food!

Patrick: Favourite thing? Probably, seeing the family, I think. Yep.

Kamilla: It's spending time with family. Being off work if possible.

Luke: And your least favourite thing?

Kayleigh: My least favourite thing, the washing up!

Lydia: Feeling all fat and full and hot at the end of the day. That's the worst thing!

Luke: Yeah I know that feeling
